
Dear Friends in Christ,

This month the Lutheran Church remembers the Reformation of the Church, which began in 1517 in Wittenberg, Germany.

That's when a monk named Martin Luther posted ninety-five theological statements on the door of the church in Wittenberg on October 31.

He did this as a response to the selling of documents called indulgences by a Dominican friar named John Tetzel

These indulgences were certificates that offered forgiveness for the purchaser.



Luther's study of the Scriptures had convinced him that God's forgiveness was offered without cost and wasn't to be purchased like a sack of potatoes.

Although Luther had intended that these statements be used as the basis for a theological debate, with the recent advent of the movable type printing press, his 95 Theses went viral and the Reformation Movement was born.

The sharp sound of Luther's hammer has for the past five centuries echoed wherever the Gospel teaching of free salvation by grace through faith in Christ has been proclaimed.

In the words of Luther's great hymn, "A Mighty Fortress,"

With might of our can naught be done, Soon were our loss effected; But for us fights the Valiant One, Whom God Himself elected. Ask ye, Who is this? Jesus Christ it is; O Sabaoth Lord And there's none other God; He holds the field forever.
