Lenten Psalm and Gospel Readings

Dear Friends in Christ,

In a few weeks we will enter the holy season of Lent.

The word "lent" actually comes from an old English word that meant "to lengthen" and referred to the lengthening of the days in spring as summer approached.

This Lenten season, I'm going to challenge myself and you to lengthen our time in God's Word.

Beginning with Ash Wednesday, you and I are going to read through the book of Psalms and the Gospels of Mark and John during the forty days of Lent.

This might sound daunting. After all, there are one hundred fifty psalms in the Bible and thirty seven chapters in Mark and John combined.

However, over the course of Lent's forty days, that's only four psalms and one Gospel chapter a day, or about fifteen minutes of your time.

Each week there will be a reading guide in the bulletin to lead you through your week.

One more thing. On Sunday morning during Bible study, we will talk about what we've read. Think of it as a book club where you can ask questions or share thoughts about the previous week's reading.

That's my challenge to you. Two and a half hours a week during Lent to lengthen our time in God's Word. Fifteen minutes a day Monday—Saturday and one hour on Sunday.
