Greetings in the name of Jesus!

February 14. Valentine's Day. Hearts and flowers and boxes of chocolate.

February 14, 2024. Ash Wednesday. Ashes and repentance and somber reflection. But also a flower.

On Ash Wednesday, as we gather to begin the holy season of Lent, we will place a rose in a vase on the altar.

This rose will remain on the altar throughout Lent, unwatered, uncared for.

Together we will watch it wither. Together we will watch it fade.

This rose, a symbol of love, in its dying will illustrate the words of Isaiah:

- "All men are like grass, and all their glory is like the flowers of the field.
- The grass withers and the flowers fall, because the breath of the Lord blows on them. Surely the people are grass.
- The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God stands forever." (Isaiah 40:6-8)

We will also see in this rose a picture of our Lord Jesus, the very love of God embodied in flesh and blood, who willingly allowed the life to be drained from Him on the cross.



Yet He who joined us in our dying condition is also the true Word of our God who stands forever and shares His resurrection life with us.

After Lent comes Easter. After the dying comes the rising.

God be with you as we prepare to begin our Lenten journey together in anticipation of the Easter joy to follow.
