Last month I joined other pastoral leaders of the Texas District for the Exponential 2024 conference on discipleship.

This three day conference opened my eyes to how important it is that Messiah become a church that intentionally holds **disciple-making** to be **Job** #1.

Making disciples, who themselves, make more disciples, is our business, because Jesus told us that it is our business.

He gave His eleven apostles their job description before His return to His throne at the Father's side.

In Matthew 28 we read, "Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and *make disciples* of all nations, *baptizing* them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, *teaching* them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

We need to restore the function of the priesthood of all believers, as described in 1 Peter 2:9.
